Keith Famie Director/Producer/Author

Director/Producer Keith Famie was, for many years, known as a celebrity chef and a metro Detroit restaurateur. He was selected as one of America's "Best New Chefs" in 1989 by Food and Wine magazine; Esquire Magazine chose his restaurants as "Best New Restaurant" in America on two separate occasions. Famie was also a finalist on the 2001 reality television series, "Survivor, the Australian Outback."

Keith hosted his own Food Network series, "Keith Famie's Adventures," traveling the world documenting cooking styles from the plains of Africa to monk monasteries of Taiwan, to the lifestyle of Key West. In 2004, the Adventure Chef embarked on a new journey - documentary filmmaking. "I didn't want to be the 'Adventure Chef' guy anymore. I wanted to help people tell their stories."

Since that life-changing decision, Famie has been awarded twelve Michigan Emmys and been nominated several other times for his rich, human-interest storytelling, from ethnic documentaries to military tribute films. He and his team at Visionalist Entertainment Productions create informative, entertaining films that touch a wide audience.

Along with documentary filmmaking, Famie has released several books throughout his career, Famie's Adventures in Cooking (2001), You Really Haven't Been There Until You've Eaten the Food (2003), Living Through the Lens (2019), and Papa's Rules for Life (2021).


Outside of documentary production, Keith is involved in charitable projects. In 2003, Keith finished the 25th anniversary Ironman Triathlon World Championship in Kona with Team In Training for the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society. In 2015, he was awarded the 2015 Diamond Award by the Association for Women in Communications Detroit Chapter. In 2017, Keith was presented the Media Award by the Gilda's Club of Metro Detroit, and in 2023, Keith was awarded a Dove Award from The Arc of Oakland County for Media Distinction. Over the years, Keith has been actively involved in several well-respected, Michigan-based 501(c)(3) organizations that support everything from children with cancer and hunger relief to veterans' issues.

Veteran filmmaker Keith Famie's look at Detroit's spiritual heritage will air at 8 p.m. Dec. 12 on Detroit Public Television

DETROIT — Since its inception in 1701, Detroit has been home to hundreds of churches and spiritual congregations. Throughout Detroit's history, these churches have remained stalwart reminders and players in the Motor City's strength and long, rich history.

Veteran filmmaker Keith Famie set out to tell the story of Detroit's history through 17 different churches in a 90-minute documentary special, "Detroit: The City of Churches." After months of

A new car documentary in the making set to release on Fathers Day weekend next year will feature a few familiar faces and places from the Northport area.

Keith Famie, metro Detroit native, director, and producer of the upcoming documentary called "Detroit: The City of Hot Rods and Muscle Cars," will be filming in the area at the end of the month, conducting interviews with local car enthusiasts like Darin Irvine, Bill Collins, Jerry Palmer, Keith Ashley and Dan McDavid. The segments highlight the Leelanau peninsula's collector car culture, but the entire project will ultimately capture the unique Detroit muscle car community and how Motor City iron has reached across the globe and shaped world culture.

The final two hour-long film will debut on Detroit Public Television (PBS) as a holiday special in 2023, and will premiere at the Henry Ford, with classic muscle cars and hot rods also on display. With media, community leaders, celebrities, and other supporters present, some of the proceeds from the premiere gala will benefit five local Michigan charities. There are plans to show the film at a location in Leelanau with details of when and where set to release at a later date.

Keith Famie and his Visionalist Entertainment Productions team filmed for the documentary "Detroit: The City of Hot Rods & Muscle Cars" during the Woodward Dream Cruise with Vietnam veterans on Aug. 20.

The new film that will capture the story of Detroit's car culture, now in production by Famie and his team, accelerated filming during the 2022 Woodward Dream Cruise.

The two-hour documentary film is a historical tribute to Detroit's foundation in automation and its evolution, tracking down the original enthusiast, the first shade tree mechanics and car collectors. The love of steel and speed transcends generations, and it also defies the constraints of gender and background. The documentary is a celebration of the unique Detroit hot rod and muscle car community and how Motor City iron has circumnavigated the globe and shaped world culture, according to a press release.

Through this segment, the film introduced the Woodward Dream Cruise which will take the audience down memory lane on what it was like to cruise down Woodward in the 60s and 70s and today. The historical state police coordinated ten car procession was led by a 1965 Ford State Police cruiser escort with 20-year-old Troy from Rainbow Connection. Troy was diagnosed with acute myeloid leukemia (AML) in June 2021.



EASTPOINTE — A group of local war veterans got behind their steering wheels July 21 at John F. Kennedy Memorial Park in Eastpointe.

The military men sat down with local filmmaker Keith Famie to be part of his documentary, "Detroit: The City of Hot Rods & Muscle Cars."

The veterans, who brought their cars with them, shared stories about drag strips, why they spend so much time under the hoods of their vehicles, and serving their country.

Executive producers of the film are Famie, and John and Carole Kulhavi. Famie is a producer, director and author with Visionalist Entertainment Productions in Wixom. He grew up in Farmington Hills and resides in Novi. Famie had a Ford Mustang and a Chevrolet Corvette while growing up.

According to a letter from Fred Nahhat, the senior vice president of production for Detroit Public TV, "Detroit: The City of Hot Rods & Muscle Cars" will premiere "centered around Father's Day 2023." According to the letter, there also will be a special preview screening for families, sponsors and those featured in the film.

"Muscle cars didn't just change Detroit automotive culture," narrator Chuck Gaidica states in the film trailer. "They reimagined it."

Locally Produced Hot Rod Documentary Lands Tim Allen, Chip Foose

"Detroit: A City of Hot Rods and Muscle Cars," a documentary by local filmmaker Keith Famie, will include interviews with celebrity car enthusiast Tim Allen and designer Chris Foose, host of the "Overhaulin" television series and owner of Foose Designs.

Allen's personal car collection includes an original Shelby Cobra, a 1968 Pontiac GTO, a Dodge Demon, 1932 V8 Ford, vintage and modern Mustang GT350s, a modern Ford GT, a 1996 Chevrolet Impala SS with the LT5 V-8 from a C4 Corvette ZR-1, 1968 Camaro "restomod," and a modified Nova, and a Tesla Model 3, with which he says he has a "love/hate relationship."

"I wanted Tim to share his vast knowledge of the impact Detroit had on the world of 'let's go faster,' 'let's build it better," Famie says. "Allen's real respect is for those who looked at an everyday ride and said, what if we do this or do that? Will it look better? Could it be faster? Will it handle smoother?"

The footage includes Allen driving his 1950s series 60 Cadillac. While doing so, he made sure Famie and his crew felt the power under the hood of his Caddy as they circled the neighborhood that houses his private collection.

The documentary also will include an interview with Fosse, who got his start from watching his father, Sam Foose, a self-taught master welder, painter, and panel beater who displayed extraordinary mechanical skills.

"Throughout the interview, Foose was sketching and when our interview came to an end, he held up what took him a very short time to create: a tribute to Detroit with the line, 'You know, whether it's a muscle car, a hot rod, a pickup truck, no matter what it is. They all have one thing in common. They're all born in Detroit," Famie says.

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

Director Keith Famie of Novi and producers John and Carole Kulhavi of White Lake just wrapped up filming a documentary about the daily lives of children and young adults with Down syndrome.

The documentary <u>"Chromosomally Enhanced: What's Your Superpower"</u> will premiere during the holiday season on Detroit Public TV. The entire production was on a closed set – adhering to safe COVID-19 guidelines.

Famie, the Kulhavis and the rest of the Visionalist Entertainment Productions team filmed the closing scene on Oct. 10 at the Willow Run Airport/Yankee Air Museum. Nine individuals with Down syndrome pulled a B-17 Yankee Lady Bomber with the help of first responders and retired Detroit Lions icons Eric Hipple and Lomas Brown. There was a parade of flashing lights and a tank with an enormous Michigan Special Olympics flag waving in the wind.

"The hope for this film is to give a voice to these individuals who may not always get a fair chance in life while also encouraging empathy from a society that might not fully understand what it is like to live and thrive with Down syndrome," said Famie. He said that those featured in the documentary "have a sincere, caring, empathetic way in how they see the rest of humanity – spreading joy and smiles to all they meet – something the world could use a big dose of right now." The goal is to premiere the film on Detroit PBS by the end of the year before it shows on other public stations around the state. The documentary also will likely be shared nationally through PBS online and via public television.

The premise behind the documentary, "Chromosomally Enhanced: What's Your Superpower?", which Famie came to realize after spending time with children and young adults with Down syndrome, is the conclusion that their superpower is that extra chromosome, which gives them the ability to see the world through rose-colored glasses.

A special scene for the documentary was filmed last Saturday at the Willow Run Airport/Yankee Air Museum in Ypsilanti Township. For the production, nine individuals with Down syndrome came together as a team to pull

New Documentary Aims to Pass the Torch of 'Never Again' to a New Generation

Filmmaker Keith Famie is producing a documentary that tells the story of the Holocaust through the personal expressions of young people.

On Jan. 13, 2020, Keith Famie watched Edith Maniker, an 89-year-old Holocaust survivor, speak to a group of high school students about her experience escaping Nazi Germany on the Kindertransport mission. Before the talk, Famie, an Emmy-award winning director and producer, knew nothing about the rescue mission. As he listened to Maniker speak, Famie looked around the room at the group of young students and wondered what they would take away from the conversation.

"Out of the 100 kids there, two to three years from now, how many of them will remember?" he said. "I thought, there have to be more ways to tell this story to the younger generation."

It was after the talk that Famie decided he wanted to take a different approach to a film he was already planning about Holocaust survivors: to share the story through the eyes of a younger generation learning about the tragedy. The educational experiences of the young people, or "ambassadors," will comprise an hour-long PBS documentary, *Shoah Ambassadors*, produced by Famie through his Visionalist Entertainment Productions company, as well as by Warren Rose, Marjory Epstein and the Marvin and Betty Danto Family Foundation. Famie is aiming for the special to air in winter.

'Those on the Front Lines of Cancer' to Air on PBS

Almost 2 million people will be newly diagnosed with cancer this year, and almost 607,000 people will die from the disease, according to statistics from the American Cancer Society.

Local producer and director Keith Famie wanted to know what Michigan oncologists, as well as oncological clinicians and researchers from across the country, are doing to combat a disease that instantly brings upheaval to a person's life and the lives of their loved ones.

"Cancer is frightening," he said. "It's this beast with the ability to morph itself. It makes it so difficult for oncologists (to treat) because it has the ability to change itself."

Famie, with the cooperation of approximately 100 people, including Jewish doctors, patients and leaders of cancer-focused service organizations from Metro Detroit, will release the three-hour documentary, *Those on the Front Lines of Cancer*, this month.

The full documentary will air on Detroit Public Television/PBS, Channel 56, in Detroit with the first hour showing from 9-10 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 10, and the remaining two hours from 9-11 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 17.

The documentary, produced by Famie's Visionalist Entertainment Productions company, is broken into 21 segments that include a look at specific cancers like breast cancer, blood cancer, prostate cancer and childhood cancers as well as segments on precision medicine, community organizations that serve those with cancer, the issue of opioids and marijuana in allaying cancer symptoms and financial toxicity related to paying for cancer care, among other subjects.









Novi film producer interviews local residents affected by cancer in new documentary

Keith Famie, 59, of Novi, is the executive director and producer of Wixom-based Visionalist Entertainment Productions.

He began documentary film-making for PBS in 2004 and, since then, has won 11 Michigan Emmy Awards for his films.

After his "Embrace of Aging and Dying" series that began in 2013 and his "On the Frontlines of Alzheimer's and Dementia" film last year, he said he wanted to "focus on the disease that can take us out of the game and learn what can we do to stack the deck in our favor."

He and his team have been working on a two-hour PBS film documentary "Those on the Front Lines of Cancer" for the past year and are in the final-production stages.

Despite advances in medicine, treatment and therapies, cancer still kills around 600,000 Americans each year and affects people of all ages.

"Cancer is a huge subject; there isn't anybody who hasn't been touched by it or knows somebody who has," Famie said. "I've lost my friends to cancer, and I've had my own personal scares."

Famie has conducted almost 100 interviews over the past eight months for the film. These include oncologists, researchers and surgeons who share what their cutting-edge research and experience has revealed, what is being learned about disease-modifying treatments and how researching patients' genetics may change the way we approach cancer.

He interviewed doctors and researchers at the VA Medical Center in Ann Arbor, Royal Oak Beaumont, Henry Ford Health Care System, Ascension Providence Hospital, University of Michigan, Wayne State University, C.S. Mott Children's Hospital, Children's Hospital of Michigan, Moffit Cancer Center and Boca Raton Regional Hospital-Florida and the University of California-Berkley.



Former Detroit Lions quarterback Eric Hipple was out at the Horny Hollow Hunting Haven doing some hunting, which is what the 1,000-some-odd-acre camp was originally intended to be used for.

While he was there with the owner, U.S. Army Brig. Gen. John Kulhavi (ret.), Hipple envisioned an entirely different use for the facility. With its amusement park-style amenities, large and comfortable living quarters and all the outdoor activities one could imagine, Hipple thought, the camp would make a perfect place for a retreat.



That's what he told colleagues when he went back to the Eisenhower Center, an Ann Arbor-based center dedicated to the treatment of traumatic brain injuries, where Hipple runs a program called After the Impact.

Hipple took a group of people — veterans, former players, first responders — out to the camp for a retreat that included lots of discussion and reflection, plus all the fun the camp's amenities offer.



"(The camp) was perfect for that," Hipple said. "It's got a housing situation that's warm and comfortable and a huge table where we could sit around and eat, come together and get to know each other."

That's pretty much what Kulhavi, a White Lake resident, envisioned as he transitioned the camp from its original hunting origins to the recreational camp it has become. Kulhavi and four partners bought the place, located in Mio, from the 77-year-old former owner in 1971.

First they bought 320 acres and then another 320 acres in the mid-1980s. Another 398 acres were added later.

The partners had an agreement: If any of them wanted out, they had to offer to let the others buy their share. That's how Kulhavi eventually ended up owning the whole thing.

He and his wife Carole have 14 grandchildren and the camp started adding things they would like. There's 10

'Maire's Journey': Cancer victim's dying wish comes closer to fulfillment in CNY



When a Michigan woman was diagnosed with cardiac sarcoma, it was the beginning of a journey. And though the brave Maire (pronounced "Mary") Kent lost her battle on September 27, 2013, her mission continues on today.

Kent's dying wish was to travel the world, calling more attention to the disease that took her life and so many others. She chose to be cremated and have her ashes put in a boat that would travel from Lake Michigan to the Atlantic Ocean, spreading awareness along its path.

A 24-year-old <u>cancer patient</u> Maire Kent inspired the <u>Michigan</u> filmmaker Keith Famie for his documentary. Her October funeral served as its centerpiece. Famie is a 10-time Emmy-winning filmmaker.

Famie said, "I met her by chance, actually. I went to the hospital because I was having some chest pains and we ended up having the same doctor. Our conversations took off from there."

Kent was diagnosed with cancer in November 2012. She passed away by the end of September 2013. Famie was working on a documentary about the way

in which people deal with the end of their life, as a part of that he along with Kent decided to document the last part of her life and her final wishes.

The filming did not end. After the documentary he decided to shoot a 90-minute film on the journey on Kent's ashes from Michigan to the Atlantic sea. Kent, inspired by a children's book, "Paddle to Sea", in which a boy shapes a boat and lets it free in the Great Lakes wanted her ashes to go through a similar journey. Twenty four year old Kent wanted the ashes of her body to be taken from Lake Michigan to the Atlantic Ocean. "Cremate me and put my ashes in a boat. I want to go from Lake Michigan to the Atlantic Ocean," she told her family.

Her ashes, Famie said is placed in a 3-foot wooden boat, which is carved by George Wurtzel, a blind carpenter, as she wished, with all the other people's photos who have lost their lives to cancer in the boat. Kent's family also printed a personal message on its sail, as per her wishes. "My name is Maire. I died of cardiac sarcoma cancer. My ashes are enclosed in this boat and I am on my way to the ocean. If you find me, please send me back on my path. I'll bless you from Heaven."

Famie said, "The hope was that, with the help of strangers, she would have her dream come true.



As it turns out, it was kind of like the Olympic torch. People wanted to be part of this journey." He said that almost everyone has been touched by cancer and has lost someone to cancer. It is certain that we all would die too, but rarely do we think what we want our lives to mean. The boat is on a 1,400 mile journey.



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Five Qs: Keith Famie on Filming Maire's Journey

Keith Famie, a 10-time Michigan Emmy award-winning director/producer in Novi, spoke with *DBusiness Daily News* about his latest documentary project, which tells the story of Maire Kent, who died of sarcoma cancer at age 24 and requested her ashes be sent to sea.

1. DDN: Tell us about Maire's Journey.

KF: The project started out as an interview for a documentary series I was working on (*The Embrace of Dying*). But, as time progressed, I ended up doing more interviews and it became

apparent that her story should not be broken up into an episode of a series.

When Maire entered hospice — she clearly was not going to beat this — we had a lot of conversations about her desire to be cremated with her ashes (setting sail) in Lake Michigan. It was a way for her to see the world, which is something she never had a chance to do. Making a long story short, her ashes ended up in a small wooden sailboat built by George Wurtzel, a blind carpenter, and painted by an Odawa Native American. We had a ceremonial launch at sea with three Odawa women singing a strong women's song in their native tongue, with (Maire's) family standing by her side.

2. DDN: What type of reaction did you get when pitching the concept to people?

KF: Most of the time, you'd have to go, "Hello? Hello? You still there?" Because naturally, you think people had hung up on you because you just explained something that was totally ludicrous. People go, "Yeah, right, OK. That's a great fictitious story." But it's true. It's real. And what became so extraordinary about the journey was — as we had anticipated — Maire's story resonated with hundreds of people (as her boat traveled to other parts of the Northeast, including New York Harbor). Everybody has been touched by cancer in some way or will be, unfortunately, so Maire's journey became everybody's journey. People had their own moments of refection, their own epiphanies about what they would if they were going to die, their own memories of loved ones they had lost. And the whole trip became this platform of discussion from young kids to people in their 60s and 70s. I think that's probably the most touching part about what we did in this production.

24-year-old cancer victim inspires after death

(CNN) -- It was about eight months into her fight with heart cancer that 24-yearold Maire Kent knew she was going to die.

In November 2012, Kent was diagnosed with cardiac sarcoma, a rare and aggressive form of cancer. By the end of September 2013, she was gone.

But it's what happened in the final weeks of her life that made her friends and family feel as if she's still around.

"I met her by chance, actually," filmmaker Keith Famie told CNN. "I went to the hospital because I was having some chest pains and we ended up having the same doctor. Our conversations took off from there."

Famie happened to be working on a documentary about how people deal with the end of life. So he and Kent decided to document the last leg of her life and her final wishes.

Inspired by her favorite children's book, "Paddle to Sea," in which a boy carves a wooden boat and sets it free in the Great Lakes. Kent turned to her family and said, "I want to do that. I want to go to the ocean. Cremate me and put my ashes in a boat. I want to go from Lake Michigan to the Atlantic Ocean."



"She wanted to create a dialogue about cardiac sarcoma," her older brother Geoff Kent told CNN. "Her dream was to be a nurse, because she loved helping people. She knew she wasn't going to live to achieve that, so this was her way of helping people after she died. We all know someone with cancer."

Sarcoma is a rare type of cancer, and cardiac sarcoma even rarer, according to Dr. Monika Leja, a cardiologist in Ann Arbor, Michigan, who treated Kent, a former Army private.



"It can grow from any part of the body, even connective tissues. It usually happens to very healthy, young, individuals," Leja told CNN. "A purely genetic disease that's rapid growing. It's kind of like having a ticking time bomb in your body and no one is recognizing it."

Three weeks before Kent's life ended, the plans to get her ashes to the Atlantic Ocean began. And Famie was there to document the whole thing.

"It was just a little 3½-foot boat carved out of wood by a totally blind carpenter. That's what she wanted to have her ashes put in," Famie said. "The hope was that, with the

help of strangers, she would have her dream come true. As it turns out, it was kind of like the Olympic torch. People wanted to be part of this journey."

SOUTHFIELD — It hit local director and producer Keith Famie like it does any man his age — there's more time behind a person than ahead of them at a certain point.

Keith Famie began his career as a chef, lived in France, worked all over the world, had restaurants, won food and wine awards, became a celebrity chef on The Food Network, and ended up on "Survivor: The Australian Outback." (He was the last one voted off.) But when his father died from Alzheimer's nine years ago, Famie had a proverbial wake-up call.

"My father's death had a significant impact on me in a whole range of ways," said Famie. "I was holding his hand for the last moment, when he took his last breath. I had a lot of bitterness and anger. The guy had



lived this long life and I thought to myself: 'So this is it? Right here? This is the end?' It was so curious and bizarre, too. He was done. Gone. History."

At that point Famie, pushing 50, decided to change his life completely. "I was done being that travel chef guy. I wanted to do something more significant with my life. I wanted to do something that would help people tell their stories." Famie, who had his own production company and knew how to produce and direct, went on to shoot a number of Emmy-award-winning documentaries on a range of human interest subjects, including immigrant stories, the challenges faced by Vietnam vets and the world of the blind.

But as he aged, said Famie, "I'd watch my teenage son grow up bigger and stronger than me and I started thinking: 'What is it really like to grow old? What's it really like on a deep level?' I decided to go on a quest to find out." The result is a three-part series currently in-progress for PBS Michigan dedicated to exploring the many aspects of aging.

"We see these feeble guys having a hard time walking, or they're carrying oxygen tanks," says Keith Famie, 49. "When they were 19, they were flying bombing missions or parachuting behind enemy lines."

Famie, the chef-turned-filmmaker, is producing a documentary called "Detroit: Our Greatest Generation." It's about the men and women who left Detroit and went out and won the war, but it's also about the people who stayed behind and made this the Arsenal of Democracy.

It's budgeted at \$300,000, and he's so far removed from that figure that he spent Friday and Saturday at an art fair in Plymouth hawking T-shirts. He made

Then on Sunday, one of Obama's staffers sent him an e-mail. State Rep. Alma Wheeler Smith, D-Salem, and U.S. Rep. John Dingell, D-Dearborn, have been lobbying hard to put a poster-sized reproduction of the picture and signatures in Obama's hands. For one thing, he should have it, and for another, it might shake loose some sponsorships.

Deadlines will be tight Tuesday, the staffer said, but it's a definite maybe. And if today doesn't work out, at least Famie knows the film is on the presidential radar screen. He can't really afford to fly the poster to Washington, D.C., but if the chance arises, he'll go sell some more T-shirts.

Survivor tells saga of courageous homeland

Since the death of her beloved husband 13 years ago, Despina Kartakis has lived alone. But in some ways, the 71-year old West Bloomfield resident has been living alone — within her memories — since May 21, 1941.

Until this year, she considered many of these memories too horrifying to share.

Born in Crete just prior to World War II, Kartakis was a preschooler in the small seaside village of Galatas when the Nazis invaded the island following their victory in mainland Greece. Throughout the attack, transport planes dropped 8,000 German paratroopers over Crete, and the resistance of the islanders, fighting back with bird rifles and farm implements, is legendary. Unfortunately, Nazi retaliation

was swift and consummate, and the dive bombers that arrived to dispatch the Galatas snipers forced Kartakis, her younger brother Yanni and her father Manuel, to seek shelter in a natural cave behind the parish church of Panagia.

"That's when my young life was altered," Kartakis recounts, eyes misting, subconsciously touching her legion of scars. "That's when everything changed."

A bomb detonated within feet of the cave and Yanni, then 4, was killed instantly and Despina's father was badly wounded. The same blast of shrapnel tore through Kartakis' upper body and destroyed her jaw, leaving her only enough strength to crawl out through the bomb crater where she soon lost consciousness. Found by mop-up crews and believed dead, she was buried in a hastily dug grave - later, alerted by her pet dog, survivors discovered that she was still alive and brought her to a hospital in nearby Hania. Considering her beyond saving, doctors offered no medical attention beyond an injection to painlessly end her life. But as Kartakis relates, "My family refused, but the doctor pushed them aside and gave me the needle anyway. For the second time,

ecial to The Oakland Pres olish immigrants helped build Detroit and their stories deserve to be told, according to Keith Famie. "What

was it like to come to Detroit without any money or family? How did they survive? It's about forti-tude and it's about hero-ics," says the local chef turned filmmaker.

For his "Our Polish documentary, airing

7 p.m. Saturday on WXYZ-Channel 7, the Novi resident interviewed dozens of Poles in metro Detroit and traveled to Poland visiting Auschwitz and another lesser known Nazi concentration camp called Majdanek. He worked over eight months with production teams from his Wixom-based Visionalist Entertainment Productions and Kinetic Post in Southfield.

"The story is about respect and admiration for elders because they are the pioneers," Famie, 47, says.

"When they're gone, their stories are gone. We're celebrating their lives in this documentary."

After Germans, Poles make up the second largest ethnic group in metro Detroit, says historian ThadRadzil-

"In some auto factories. they were the majority," he says. "Polish was the language of the assembly line. When the (United Auto Workers union) was organizing in the 1930s, they went on Polish radio."

Some resented the immigrants. According to a survey done in the early 1960s, discrimination against Poles was second only to prejudice against African-Americans, Radzilowski says. Born and raised in Hamtramck, he remembers being stopped by police when he drove through Grosse Pointe, which had a Realtor point system to keep out Poles, Italians, blacks, Jews and Asians

until the discriminatory

practice was struck down by the Michigan Supreme Court in 1963.

As a new generation of Polish people went to college and rose in socioeconomic status, prejudice against the ethnic group faded in the 1950s and almost disappeared by the 1970s and '80s, explains the

historian. Poles should learn more about their own family histories, says Ceil Wendt Jensen, who also appears in the film. After retiring from a 30-year career as a high school teacher, the 57-year-old Rochester Hills resident became a certified genealogist. She has traced
